

# Pat wins her first ever entered competition!

Pat Hodges was born in the Queen Charlotte Hospital in Paddington in January 1932. Sadly Pat was only 4 when her mum passed away. Pat and her dad then moved to live with her aunt in Acton. Pat left school at the age of 14 and with her dad remarrying they moved back to Paddington where she



began a career as a Student Nursery Nurse working an eight hour daily shift looking after young children whilst many of their mums at this time were making parts for the many prefabricated homes that were being built. By 1950 Pat qualified as a nursery nurse and began working in a day nursery attached to a school. It was round about this time Pat met her husband to be, Phil, who was a driver of the London Underground. In 1955 they married and honeymooned in a freezing cold Weymouth. 2 years later Russell their son was born. Russell now lives with his family in Stoke on Trent. Daughter Alison was born in 1962, and she too now lives with her husband in Bridgerule.

In 1962 as the family were living in Northholt in Middlesex Pat began working with the mentally challenged whose ages ranged from two and half to nineteen years. Later, still working in education Pat worked alongside young children with a range of varying disabilities and problems but those who were capable of being integrated into an able bodied environment did so at the John Chilton School in Ealing where Pat would accompany her charges.

After retirement in 2004 Pat and her husband moved to Southfields where they live today. Pat enjoyed Line Dancing until a year or two ago and has only recently ceased volunteering her services in a local charity shop in Bude. Pat and Phil have 5 grandchildren and 3 great grandchildren.

Pat has always enjoyed sewing, making bridesmaids dresses for family and friends in years gone. She still enjoys knitting and embroidery and of course baking as does her husband Phil.

A few weeks ago Pat thought for a bit of fun she would enter our Victoria Sandwich competition and she was truly overcome when she went back to the hall to pick up her sponge to see she had the winning trophy. This was Pat's first ever competition at the age of 81 and she said she used a Mary Baker recipe. Her winning trophy is in prime position at her home. I am sure Pat made a most wonderful nursery nurse both with the able bodied and those who were less fortunate. Although she has not lived in our village for many years she is most fondly thought of by many and regularly supports local events. I wish both Pat and Phil well.

In The Buzz of Jan/Feb 2013 the editor wrote an article on Elizabeth Macarthur and her family who had originated from Bridgerule and how Elizabeth went on to be known as the first educated lady who went to Australia. A few days ago I received this email from a Michelle Scott Tucker in Australia.

#### Dear Sheila,

I'm an Australian writer, currently working on a biography of Elizabeth Macarthur. Your lovely newsletter, the Bridgerule Buzz, came up in one of my Google searches - specifically Issue No 21, Jan/Feb 2013.

In describing the life of Elizabeth Macarthur, you asked if anyone local knew where her birthplace 'Judgeworthy' was. I hope you don't mind if a non-local tries to answer?

As you've probably already worked out by now, Elizabeth Macarthur was in fact born at Lodgeworthy Farm, although she only lived there until she was about six. Then she seems to have lived locally, perhaps with her maternal grandfather, John Hatherly. Elizabeth was very close to the Kingdon family. The Rev John Kingdon's eldest child, Bridget, was of a similar age to Elizabeth and the two were "brought up together as intimate friends." After Elizabeth had sailed for New South Wales, she continued to correspond with Bridget until the latter's death in 1802. Mrs Macarthur then wrote to her god-daughter, Bridget's youngest sibling Eliza. Bridget was the oldest of eleven children (poor Mrs Kingdon!) and one of only three girls. The third, Griselda, was born in the middle of the family but she died aged 5 - apparently there is a memorial plaque for her inside St Bridget's, describing how she drowned in the Tamar.

I'm hoping to visit England around this time next year - it will be a business trip but I'm planning to squeeze in a visit to Bridgerule, if I can. It sounds lovely. Michelle Scott Tucker

Little boy got home from school and says "Dad I've got a part in the school play as a man who has been married for 25 years".

His dad replies "never mind son, maybe next time you'll get a speaking part"!

Jill Friendship nee Gilbert was born in April 1945 at a Plymouth hospital. Baby Jill came home to the then family home at "Elm Cottage". This was one of 3 small cottages just yards further on than Littlebridge Farm with her family of dad, mum and elder sister, the late Audrey Crocker. The field behind Jill was named "search light field" for obvious reasons. When Jill was 3, due to the family outgrowing their home they moved to a brand new house at 2 Bridge Park. At the age of 4 Jill contracted rheumatic fever, a very serious illness,



spending six weeks on the danger list and hospitalised in an Exeter hospital with complete bed rest. Penicillin had only been invented a year before and Jill's granddad made it his business to seek help for his granddaughter and it was the use of penicillin that saved her life. Jill actually contracted rheumatic fever not once but four times in her young childhood and although thankfully she recovered it left her with a weak heart.

Jill attended Bridgerule Primary School when she was able but sickness prevented her attending for long periods over the winter months. It was then the late Mrs Monica Bath taught her but due to Jill's weakness this could only be for one and half hours a day. Her teachers when at the primary school being a Mrs Ellis (then becoming Phare) and a Miss Taylor. Floods prevented children from going to school on several occasions during the winter when Jill was young and she recalled how the late Mr Bob Bowden riding his cart horse would wade through the floods with the papers and the post for the local shop.

Jill's health improved and at the age of 11 transferred to Holsworthy Secondary School and it was only physical activities that she was unable to take part in. Jill's family had no car and a typical very enjoyable day out in those days would be for mum to pack up the primus, some food and drink and together with another mum and her children, Mrs Chidley, Heather (now Heather Fraser) the late David Chidley and Robin, now living in Holsworthy would walk quite a distance and end up just under Grove Farm by the river Tamar and set up for the day.

On another occasion Jill and Heather Chidley walked over to where 'locals' would call the sewer beds. One day Jill found a harvest of tomatoes. Feeling really proud of her find she went home and presented them to her mum. Mum immediately quizzed her as to where she had found them and once Jill told her they were quickly disposed of!!

Jill regularly cycled a couple of miles to the Whitstone and Bridgerule Railway station and take the train to do some shopping at Holsworthy for her family. At the station she could be greeted by the late Mr J. Bewes or the late Mr C. Short.

The day before Jill was 15 she left school and the day after her birthday she began her first job as a secretary of the North Cornwall Brick Company based at what we now know as Hedley Wood Caravan Park. The late Norman Stansbury was manager and the late Tom Palmer was foreman. At its full capacity this brick company employed 40—50 men and was a subsidiary of Western Counties Brick Company of Plymouth. Jill being the only female on site! It was here that the complete cycle of the production of a brick was carried out. Every process being carried out by hand and it being a dirty and dusty job.

Jill told me that clay was excavated from nearby quarries to the east and put into a grinder where it was mixed and ground. This was then sent down shoots into 3 brick machines by the 'setters'. The kiln was made up of 14 chambers. Each chamber could contain 4000 bricks. A fire burnt continuously to keep the kiln working and 3 men, known as 'burners', were responsible for this. Jill recalled at the time they were the late Alf Chidley, the late Frank Sleep and the late Arthur Tucker. It took 14 days from clay

to being able to take bricks from the kiln. The fire burnt coal, the technical name, quarter to dust and this was shipped from Wales to Hayle in Cornwall. Massive lorries with high sides would then transport this dust to the brickworks. Here it would unload the dust and re-load with bricks. The main hauliers Jill contacted regularly was Greenaway and Greenaway and F.J. Hopgood and Sons. At this time the bricks were well sought after, particularly due to the colour of the brick and she would do the paperwork for 10-15 lorry loads of bricks being taken away daily to places such as London, Plymouth and Exeter. Jill cycled to work each day and remembers that her wage at 15 was £2.50.

At first, her job was basic office work which included sending the workforce weekly timesheets to Plymouth. But it wasn't long before her employer saw potential and she was quickly trained to do wages. She still remembers the telephone number being Bridgerule 233 and when she phoned the head office if was Plymouth 72745! Sadly accidents did happen to employees at the brickworks and some were serious.


Lightning struck the chimney on one occasion and the services of a steeplejack were needed to repair and place new bands around the main chimney. A Yorkshire man by the name of Fred Dibnah arrived, towing a caravan to stay on site for a week. Jill remembers him climbing the chimney like a cat with no safety equipment. Colin Cholwill confirms this as he and his late dad had watched in awe Fred Dibnah at work. Climbing this chimney to the top, (higher than the church tower) standing up and walking around the chimney edge kicking off the old bricks. Jill remembers paying him £200 for the repair.

By 1964 the building trade was seeing a decline and brickyards around the country saw stock piles of bricks. Consequently yards closed. This did happen at Whitstone & Bridgerule but not for long. But the fire had to be relit and it was only because the manager, the late Norman Stanbury could remember this process after seeing his father and grandfather doing it that the fire could be erected. Jill was given the privilege of lighting that fire. This fire having to burn a week before the correct temperature was met and the whole process of making bricks could begin. In 1961 a young Mick Friendship

came to Jill's office seeking employment. Mick was fortunate and he was given the job as a 'drawer', taking bricks out of the kiln and stacking them. Working alongside a young Frankie Vanstone and Victor Bickle. But in 1967 Western Counties Brick Company went into liquidation and in 1968 the Whitstone and Bridgerule Brickworks was finally closed. The first brick that came from the yard is above the barn door at Tackbear Manor. It has the name Whitstone and Bridgerule Tile Company on it.

Meanwhile Mick and Jill started meeting socially and in 1966 they were married at St. Bridget's by the Rev. Piggott with a reception in our village hall. Honeymooning in Southend but not before they had spent a night at The Nags Head in Exeter and travelling in their much loved Ford Anglia with the silencer falling off whilst going through the centre of Exeter! On return Mick and Jill lived in a caravan on their building site which fifteen months later became 'Migil' their home, known now as Witsend.

In 1968 Amanda their daughter was born and two years later Joanne. In 1973 work for Mick took the family away to live in Tavistock which is where they continue to live since retirement. They now have three grandchildren, George, Holly and Alice. Over the years Jill has been dealt more than her share of illness including being diagnosed with MS in 1988 but she has not let this hold her back. She enjoys her garden and going on breaks to the family caravan based at Harlyn Bay. It has been lovely to meet up with Jill again and I thank her for inviting me into their home making it possible for the readers of The Buzz to get a snapshot of once what was once a thriving brickworks in our community. My best wishes go to both of them.



# Your funeral, your choice by Alison Timms.

Have you ever considered what kind of funeral service you might have? If you have a faith and a preferred place of worship then it is straightforward but what happens if you don't? Provided you then arrange to have a burial or cremation you can pretty much do as you wish.

I have recently trained to become an Independent Funeral Celebrant and my aim is to help families have a choice and to plan and hold a beautiful and meaningful funeral in the way that they want, celebrating the life of the person who has died according to their beliefs and feelings and "It's a day of mixed skies, lots of sunshine with some big clouds. Grief is like that, as big as the clouds are, there are always patches of blue and sunshine to keep you going......."

I do not want to compete with the local church or chapel, nor do I want to offend anyone -our local ministers do offer comfort and solace to those that seek it. My aim is to offer families an alternative funeral service. I would visit the family and work with them to design a service that incorporates elements of any faith or of no faith at all; we can use poems, hymns, songs, readings, prayers and favourite music; we can build a ceremony that is meaningful and right, a fitting tribute to the person who has died. I am able to hold this service wherever you choose including at the local crematorium so that your farewell is the one you want to give. You would have as much input and take part as much as you wanted or felt able to. I would charge the same fee as the local minister so you would not be paying more for a very personal funeral service! There is a company called Green Fuse which deals very sensitively with the subject of death and funerals and it is with them that I have trained.
