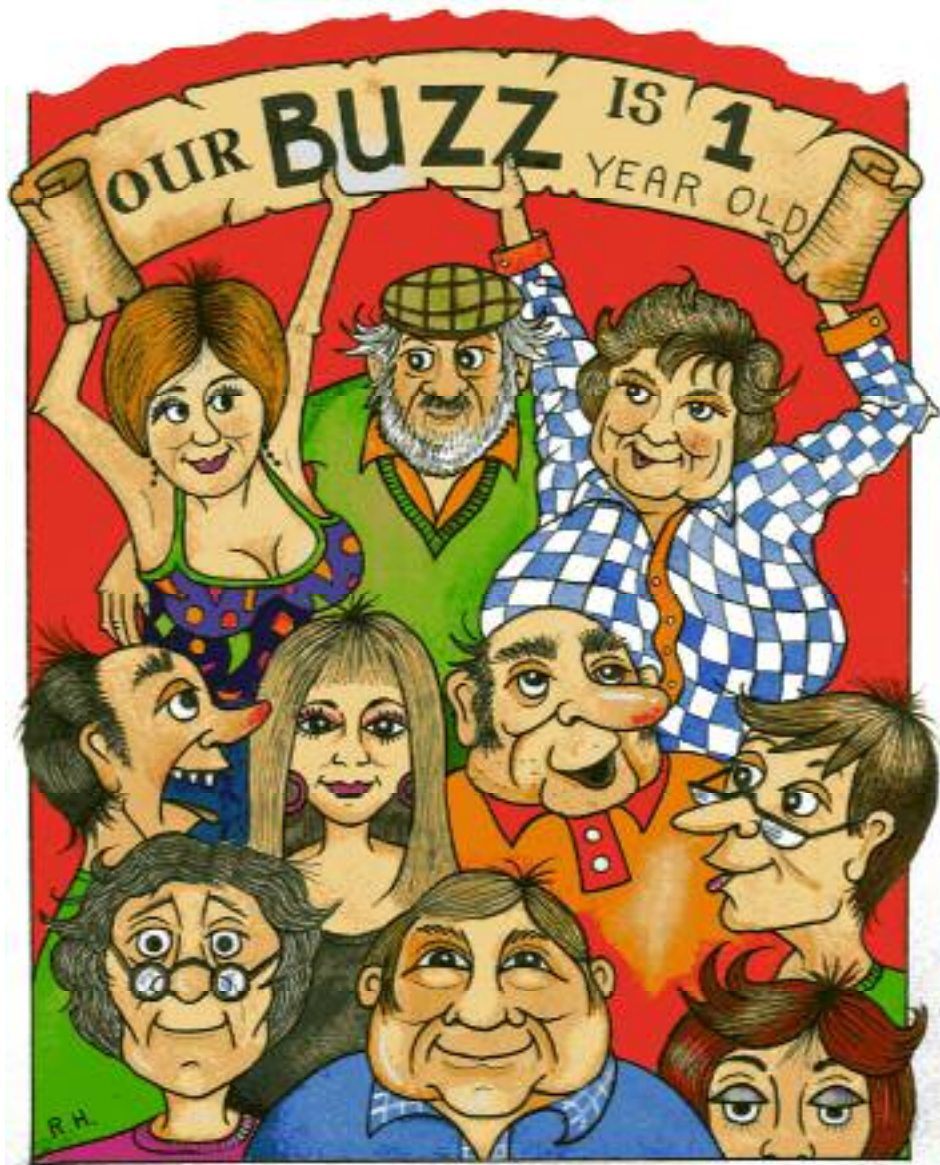

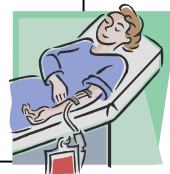

Spotlight on Mrs. Barbara Hale:

Miss Barbara Garrett was born at Mill Farm, Cherhill in Wiltshire on 26th October 1933. She began her education by attending St Mary's School for girls in Calne. Following a family move six years later she attended the Grammar School for girls in Chipping Sodbury.

She became a member of the local Girl Guides and it was at the age of seventeen her mum thought it would be good for Barbara to attend the Guiding Centre in Pax Hill, former home of Lord and Lady Baden Powell to complete an intensive course in Domestic Science. It was here whilst completing her course that she met Lady Powell on one of her regular visits to the Centre. Upon completion of the Domestic Science course she went to Bristol to complete her City and Guilds in Cookery and later became a cookery demonstrator for the Electricity Board in Chipping Sodbury. Barbara enjoyed riding her horse and in her teens she regularly rode with the Berkeley Hunt.

It was at a regular Young Farmers Club meeting that she met her husband to be, George, and they were married on the 2nd June 1954 in Iron Acton.

A year later George and Barbara had their first child, David (who now farms at Lodgeworthy with his wife Vivienne) and later their daughter, Sally-Ann was born. She now resides with her husband William at Upton.

From Gate Farm in Itchington George, Barbara and the family moved in 1964 to Narracott Farm in Highampton. George became very involved with The National Farmers Union and this involvement also meant Barbara travelled on occasions with her husband. In May 1968 the family sold their farm in Highampton to purchase Lodgeworthy. Barbara recalled the farm being cut off due to floods on their first Christmas at Lodgeworthy. It was from here that Barbara ran a bed and breakfast business alongside working on the farm. Later with her daughter they became founder members of a small farm holiday group 'Hideaway Farm Holidays', providing accommodation and food for tourists from all parts of this country and abroad.

In 1975 Barbara accepted the invitation to be Bridgerule Carnival President and recalls with some humour having to say a speech in competition with the public address system. everything she said was echoed!)

She recalled attending past village Carnival days when it began with an afternoon opening ceremony on The Ham. This was followed by children's sports and various sideshows. Everyone would then proceed to the Parish Hall for a tea. Not enough room to accommodate everyone at the first sitting! The carnival and fancy dress then took place, rounded off by adults sports. The carnival committee have been indebted to the Hale family for giving permission each year to hold various events on The Ham since they moved to Lodgeworthy.

In 1995, upon George's retirement, David, Vivienne, James and Christopher, who had been living in The Villa, swapped homes with George and Barbara to live at Lodgeworthy.

Ridgeway, the home Barbara now lives in was designed and built with George in mind but sadly that was not to be and in March 2005 after being ill for quite a while George died.

Barbara enjoys travelling and has some happy memories of time spent with her late husband in places like Norway, Ireland, Holland, Bruges, Yugoslavia and the Caribbean and plans are afoot for more!

Barbara has five grandchildren, Charlotte, Emily, James, Harriet and Christopher. Her love of travelling has been passed to her grandchildren by giving each of them, on their sixteenth birthday a holiday abroad. More recently she has become great grandmother to little Matthew.

She also enjoys painting using different medias. In fact her home has several framed pictures of her own art on display. A keen photographer Barbara also makes birthday and Christmas cards for members of her family using her art skills or by making use of her computer. (her Christmas cards are almost finished already and by now David will have received his personalised birthday card!). She gets much enjoyment from her garden and from reading books and each week joins a walking group for a three mile hike.

More recently she joined the local Line Dance class and says she really enjoys it.

The editor wishes to thank this busy lady who will soon celebrate her 77th birthday for her hospitality and for sharing some of her personal experiences for The Buzz readers.

GOLDEN CELEBRATIONS

Guardsman Brock was on leave from Cyprus and decided to go to the then very popular dance venue - 'The Headland'.

It was here that he met a Miss Angela Ayliffe who lived in Bude and worked in Holsworthy for the Inland Revenue. A month later Terry left the Coldstream Guards and returned to live at Arthmead Bridgerule. It was from February 14th 1959 that The 'courtship' with Angela began. They became engaged after six months and on the 23rd July 1960 they were married at St Michael's Church in Bude. Angela was given away by her



brother Nicholas and Terry's best man was his brother, Den. Their bridesmaids were Susan Wonnacott (nee Rogers) Mary Osborne (nee Brock) and Gill Rawlings (nee Ellis). The reception was held at The Bullers Arms Marhamchurch.

Their honeymoon was to be spent in Newquay travelling in a green 1932 Ford Popular bought for £8! It was whilst they were travelling to their honeymoon destination that they discovered someone (they think they know who) had wired a fish to the car exhaust! So they had to stop at Wainhouse Corner Garage and have it taken off!

Five nights were spent at Newquay at a cost of £6.15shillings.

Mr and Mrs Brock returned from honeymoon to live at Bevills Hill Cottage with Terry milking for the late Mr R.T. Cooper and building for the late Mr. J.R.J. Rees. In August 1961 Karen, their first child was born. (her pram was used for the recent Flower Festival in Bridgerule Chapel).

In 1964 the family left Bevill's Hill and Terry worked solely for Mr. J.R.J. Rees. This employment lasted 34 years upon Terry's retirement.

For a short while the family lived in Bude and in May 1965 baby Alison was born. Later that year they moved to the much loved home they are still living in today at 3 The Green. Sadly, Tina their third child born in 1969 was only three and half months old when she passed away. It was after this that Angela began working for Social Services supporting parents and children with Special Educational Needs. Her dedication for this work spanned 40 years until her retirement last year. In fact she still meets a small group who are now 'friends' rather than clients, on a regular basis.

Terry and Angela have fond memories of attending many dances in the parish hall. Karen and Alison would accompany their dad and mum sometimes and it was on these occasions that Terry taught his daughters to dance.

Another regular family outing was spent at Exeter Greyhound Race Track. One green mini van, blanket on floor, Karen, Alison and Hoola Dancer (that's her racing name - at home the greyhound was known as Sally) in the back and off they would go! No seat belts then and £1.50 if you were lucky to win first prize.

Terry and Angela both feel very fortunate to have always had their family living close to them. They also said that in latter years they are grateful to have spent some lovely holidays with some of their friends.

So on 23rd July 2010 Terry and Angela celebrated their Golden Wedding Anniversary with their family and some friends at The Golf Club Holsworthy. *(We all had a great time!)*

In addition. The Fare Car Service F8 will be extended to cover Bridgerule as well as Pyworthy. This is a bookable service which offers travel both to Holsworthy (including the Hospital) and Launceston (but not Bude). There are five arrivals in Holsworthy per day and four departures. The service is operated for Devon County Council by Holsworthy Cars who can be contacted on 01409 259160. The fare £3.50 for a one way trip be it Holsworthy or Launceston. This does not affect the Service 599 buses running direct to and from Exeter leaving Bude at 8.40am but will only return via Bridgerule if requested to driver.
